When Cecelia asked me to write this article, I immediately said yes. Then as I began, I realized how unusual the timing is. I am writing the article in October to be read in November. I can only speculate what our lives will be as we are reading this issue of Voice.

Our lives are in constant flux. Some things we can control and many others we cannot. On my refrigerator is a large magnet with the words “Jesus, I trust in You.” Jesus is with us every moment of every day. exacerbated by the events of 2020. We are nostalgic for the pre-Covid past.

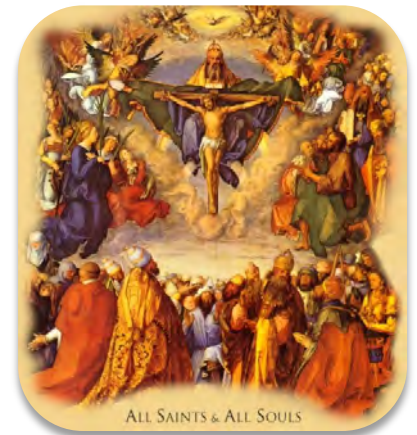

Older Cursillistas who haven't sponsored in a while and would like refresher.

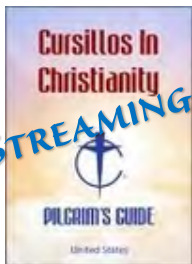

♪ “When you least expect it, you’re elected...” ♪ So begins the theme of the classic television comedy show, *Candid Camera*. Back in the days before there were hundreds of channels and video on demand, America would all tune in at the same time and laugh together at the hysterical situations that ordinary people were placed in. I remember one episode that was filmed in the local diner near my house in New York. In it Phyllis George sat at the counter wearing a hat with a huge feather, and every time she turned her head the feather would slap the person next to her in the face and draw a comical reaction. I can recall thinking, “that’s right in my neighborhood, it could have happened to me, or someone that I know.”

As we come into the early days of November, the word elect has been on everyone’s mind a lot lately. By definition it means to make a choice, or it can be used as a noun for one who is chosen. Political elections have important consequences, so I encourage everyone to exercise their civil duty to understand each candidate’s policies, especially bearing in mind how those policies will affect the issues of life and religious liberty, and to vote your moral conscience. As important as the election is, in these months leading up to Election Day, we’ve been subjected to a barrage of political campaign ads, phone calls, and text messages that have, quite frankly, not brought us much joy.

The harassment level and divisiveness has been so high that in some ways “Election” can feel like a dirty word, and we can’t wait for it to be over. In a religious context, elect is a beautiful word. Throughout the Old Testament the people of Israel are referred to as “The Elect”, the chosen people to whom God reveals himself. The concept also appears frequently in the New Testament, and Saint Paul often addresses his epistles to those who are “called to be holy.” As Catholics we celebrate the Feast of All Saints on November 1st, and we should allow the example of the Saints in Heaven to remind us of our calling. In the sacrament of baptism, those who are to be baptized are known as the Elect because they have been chosen by Christ to enter into and be joined to His Holy life.

In some ways, elections in politics are quite the opposite of elections in Faith. In the political realm we often find ourselves choosing the lesser evil between

imperfect people, in hope that they will do a good job. In our overly secularized culture today, partisan political convictions can resemble the worship of false messiahs, which will always bring some level of disappointment. In stark contrast to this, Christ tells us in John 15:16 “It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain.”

In our Christian election the one true Messiah, who is all good and all loving, chooses us and then gives us a job to do. In the very next line of John’s gospel Jesus gives us the means to carry out the mission and fulfill our hopes by His commandment to “Love one another”.

While our sanctity can only be accomplished through the grace of God, it also requires our cooperation. Yes we have been called, but we have to willingly elect to answer the call. Sometimes we are called in ways that we don’t expect, and they turn out to be the most grace-filled experiences. Two years ago I was blessed to serve on the core team on Cursillo 915. It was a wonderful

weekend in which Bishop Nevares was present for almost the entire time and we had an opportunity to get to know one another in that special way in which friendships are built on Cursillo weekends. As we were saying our goodbyes after the Clausura, Bishop put his hand on my shoulder and said, “Joe, I think that you should run for the Secretariat.”

I’ll have to admit at that moment I probably looked like one of those innocent people on *Candid Camera*. I was a little in shock, wondering where the camera was hidden. My wife, Angie, however stood across from me with that “See, I told you so” look. She had told me the same thing several times, but I always resisted. I was just fine with rainbows, roosters, and rosaries, but I wanted no part of what I perceived to be governing the movement. I said that I would pray about it, and after a few weeks and many hours in Adoration, my prayers evolved from “Why me?” to envisioning how we can best serve the Lord through Cursillo. My “yes” to the call has brought nothing but joy and grace. Serving the Cursillo Movement is so unlike what serving in a divided government must be like. Our Secretariat is a team built on love of Christ, love of the Cursillo movement, and most importantly as Christ

commanded, love of one another. Perhaps the greatest inspiration for me has been seeing how you, my fellow Cursillistas, continue to step up and serve the Lord with gladness whenever an opportunity arises.

It was a wonderful success measured not only by the funds that we raised, but most especially by the smiles and laughter of all of you who attended either at home or in person. The committee who put the event together want to thank you with all of our hearts.

I hope that you will pray about whether Jesus is calling you to serve him in this way, or perhaps in another. For now I'll close with these words from the third letter of Saint John; "I have much to write to you, but I do not wish to write with pen and ink. *Below are brief descriptions of the three positions. Please go to the website to the Secretariat page to read full information in both the very detailed Apostolic Plan and the Articles of Operation.*

**The Secretariat Chair of the Precursillo** will ensure the selection and preparation of candidates who will live a Cursillo within the Diocese. The Chair will ensure that the Secretariat person, or group delegated by the Secretariat, receives an application for each candidate that is properly filled out and submitted in a timely manner, as well as providing the necessary support according to the candidate's particular circumstances. To ensure that this process and the necessary follow-up exists for each candidate, the Chair, with his/her committee, will ensure that the sponsor/sponsors know the candidate, and has established a sincere friendship, so as to facilitate a smooth transition from the Precursillo to the Postcursillo by way of the 3-day weekend.

**The Secretariat Chair of the Postcursillo** ensures that Cursillistas within the Diocesan Movement have the opportunity to grow in their Fourth Day. This is accomplished by assuring a link between the School of Leaders and the Ultreyas within the Diocese. Furthermore,

the Chair of the Postcursillo ensures that each Ultreya maintains its essence; its living and sharing of the love of God and of neighbors in the environments. The Chair of the Postcursillo is also responsible for determining and scheduling Diocesan, Regional, and National workshops. The Postcursillo Chair working with a liaison in the School of Leaders is to maintain a schedule of all existing Ultreyas.

**The Secretariat Secretary** will keep the minutes of all Secretariat meetings and see to it that they are distributed promptly to all who should receive them. The Secretary will see to it that their language mailing lists are up-to-date, and will assume responsibility for all mailings sent out by the Secretariat as well as other duties usually associated with this position. The Secretary will record all attendance turned into them from the Chair of the Cursillo School of Leaders. This record of attendance is important and must be kept current at all times; it will be used for the selection of future Three-day team members.

November stirs my soul. Memories of my mother stream through my mind as her birthday is celebrated November 4<sup>th</sup>. She would be turning 90. November 1<sup>st</sup> we celebrate All Saints and then All Souls November 2<sup>nd</sup>. November 3<sup>rd</sup> is Election Day, which my mother was always enamored with, especially if it fell on her birthday and, if her candidates won. Thanksgiving is a day of gathering the family and filling the house with gratitude for all we have and hold dear, for all the wonderful food, good health and for God as our Provider. This year, especially, we give thanks for all we've been through in the World and our Country. I miss my mother's efforts to create special memories at Thanksgiving dinners and gatherings. She died in 2012 and I was so blessed to be with her at that time, singing and praying throughout the night before she passed on in the early morning.

My name is Mary Hauer and I lived my Cursillo in Advent of 1991 at Mt. Claret. My husband, Artie, and I have lived our Fourth Day for 29 years! Group Reunions have been my saving Grace; helping me stay on the path and steadying the tripod of Piety, Study and Action. These past 8 (!) years with my present group sisters have challenged me to build upon the virtues and gifts of the Holy Spirit. We haven't met often during the pandemic but we text and keep each other in prayer.

With the pandemic in its ninth or tenth month now, I continue to pray for the gift of Fortitude as we go to Mass and sing with all our energy in the choir. I also support our Parish of St. Paul leading a weekly Monday Rosary for the USA, inspired by Manny Yrique's ministry at Mt. Claret. We are grateful our Parish administration has allowed us to continue to meet in the Church in person. Our Country truly needs this special prayer prayed as a community.

I am very grateful to be fully employed despite the pandemic. Working from both home and the office has kept me busy and feeling useful. With no co-workers around and my house so quiet, I take advantage of the quiet time by playing podcasts from EWTN and Relevant Radio, "attending" Mass around the World via YouTube, singing with favorite Christian artists, listening to Scott Hahn's daily messages along with those of Bishop Robert Barron and many more. I cancelled that gym membership I wasn't using and put the money toward a membership with the Word on Fire Institute. I find it helpful to study the daily readings and catch homilies during online liturgies. I feel so blessed to have time to read and listen; whereas, before the pandemic began, I found it difficult to find time to study. This uncertain time is helping me draw closer to God. Glory to God!

Our family life draws me out of my home office to serve as well as I can in Faith, Hope and Charity. Our oldest is back living with us at 36. He needs direction and we offer all we can,

depending totally on our faith in the Holy Spirit to guide us with the right words to say. Artie and I have matured in our trust with one another enough to know what not to say or how not to act or react with him. We have our faith communities with us through prayer that our son will find his way. It reminds me of the Ideal Rollo. He is trying hard to command by himself when giving his life to the Lord would lead to a bright new path. I encourage his friendships with those who are Christian. I pray as St. Monica teaches us, along with the many other Saints who didn't give up hope that their families would know Jesus' Love.

Our daughters are also away from the Church and live their lives how they see fit. Our oldest daughter announced her pregnancy at our 38<sup>th</sup> Wedding Anniversary family gathering. Our granddaughter is almost one year old. She was born New Year's Eve! She was due Christmas Day. Our daughter is raising her daughter on her own but with our full support. We offer babysitting when we're able. Whatever we can do to help raise this beautiful child as one who knows love from all who surround her, that's what we'll do.

Our youngest is cohabitating with her boyfriend and, like her siblings, disinterested in returning to her faith. Again, we act in Faith, Hope and Charity in our relationships with our children. These souls are so loved by their Creator. They see us live our daily walk with the Lord. We just need to continue to invite them to join us and see the light. Nothing is impossible with God.

I hear our Blessed Virgin Mary telling me to be strong and listen to her Son. My joy comes in the morning, yes. I rise and pray the Morning Offering, my heart song: *"O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I offer you my prayers, works joys and sufferings of this day. In union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass throughout the World, and, in reparation for all our sins, I pray for the intentions of your Most Sacred Heart and those of our Holy Father, Pope Francis, Amen."*

Yes, November stirs my soul as I remember my amazing mother raising the six of us rambunctious kids in the Catholic

Church in the Deep South. I remember my dear father, also, and ALL the souls who have gone before me, marked with the sign of Faith. I pray for them, especially this month as we recall those special to us on November 2<sup>nd</sup>. They and all the Saints

have shown us the way. Now, we are entrusted in showing our children and those put in our path.

Have Mercy on all the souls in Purgatory, O Lord.

## EASY TITHE

- **First, we would like to thank all of you who are currently enrolled with Easy Tithe. 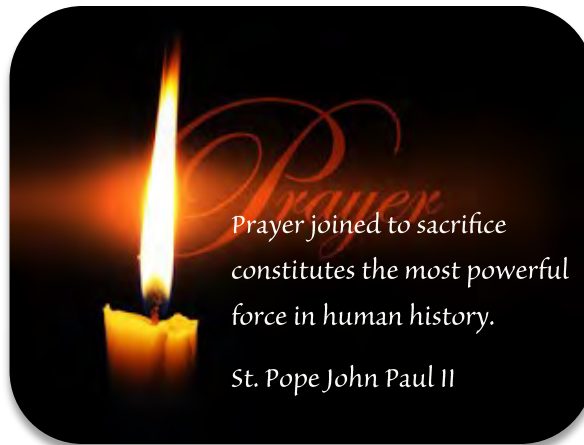
