



ARTICLES LAY DIRECTOR

Recently my wife Angela and I had the pleasure of visiting New Orleans, Louisiana. We went anticipating a fun getaway with great food, music, and culture, and the trip was everything that we expected and more. Several friends told us that if you're in New Orleans, you have to go the National World War II Museum, and so we did. What we discovered was so much more than an archive of battles past, but an amazingly moving tribute to the selfless sacrifice of a generation who gave their all to serve the greater good. This Memorial Day weekend I find myself reflecting about my grandfather, who proudly served his country during that great struggle.

If you walked into my grandfather's house after his passing nearly forty years ago you might say that he was a hoarder, but I'd like to think of Grandpa as a more of a "keeper." Even after he and my grandmother moved to Staten Island, he would never let go of the home in Queens that he was born in and where he raised his children. In the Gospels Jesus says that "Where your

treasure is, so also will your heart be." And my

grandfather stored up a lifetime of personal treasures that must have been dear to his heart. Under his bed he had an entire duffel bag full of letters written by my grandparents during the war that shed some light on the

painful torment of being separated from those you love in times of crisis.

I remember when I was about 8 years old I got a brand new Schwinn Stingray bicycle for Christmas. My grandfather, recognizing the perils of keeping such a beautiful gift safe in our working class New York neighborhood, gave me an antique padlock that he took from a large wooden box, which he explained was his footlocker. Thirteen years later I was surprised to find that footlocker in the exact same spot in his house, and when I opened it I discovered his Army dress uniform neatly

folded and preserved. The Eisenhower style jacket fit me perfectly and in my now 21 year old mind it was the epitome of vintage chic. It even had a tag inside with the date of issue from 1942. I reasoned that since Grandpa had unlocked the footlocker for me years earlier, he wouldn't mind if I wore the jacket, and it soon became a

personal treasure to me. I wore that jacket everywhere, not just because I thought it looked cool, but it gave me a profound sense of connection to my family history.

In reality, most of the things in my grandfather's collection were not of such a personal nature.



His small apartment resembled a packed warehouse full of old newspapers and an array of things bought from mail order ads in the back of magazines, most of which were never even opened. Of all of the curiosities that were found, there's one that sticks in my mind and always puzzles me. It was a shirt that my siblings and I had given him for Father's day many years earlier, still folded and wrapped in tissue paper inside the gift box. It raises the question; what good are gifts that go unused?

The three Sundays that we are in the midst of now, taking out of the Easter season and into ordinary time are full of reminders of God's gifts. At Pentecost of course, Jesus sends us the Advocate and like the Apostles we are presented with the gifts of the Holy Spirit. On the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity the first reading from Deuteronomy reminds us of the gift of being chosen as God's adopted people. "Did anything so great ever happen before? Was it ever heard of? Did a people ever hear the voice of God speaking from the midst of fire, as you did, and live?" The following Sunday we celebrate the greatest gift of all on the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, Jesus's total offering of himself in the sacrifice of His Body and Blood,

and the grace to enter into communion with His divine presence through the gift of the Eucharist.

Angie and I were blessed to attend mass at the beautiful gothic Cathedral of Saint Patrick's in New Orleans for the Feast of Pentecost. One of the interesting features of the sanctuary was a classic raised ambo that had a canopy over it in the shape of a seashell. It reminded me that we are not only called to listen to the Word, but that we also have a baptismal mission to share in the Gospel. In his homily the priest asked the faithful a question that I think we should all ask ourselves "What are you doing with the Gifts of the Holy Spirit that you have been given?"

As we begin to emerge from the restrictions of the global pandemic and are finally able to hold Cursillo weekends again this month, it's clear that there is much work that can be done. A simple thing that we can do today is pray for one another and for the candidates and teams on the June weekends. Please sign up for an hour of Adoration at Mount Claret via the link on the Phoenix Cursillo website. We can also show the support of the Community by showing up and giving the new Cursillistas a warm Cursillo welcome at the Clausuras.

The lead into these weekends has highlighted the importance of, and *great need for Parish Representatives*. We also have four positions opening up on the diocesan secretariat at the end of 2021, Lay Director, Treasurer, Three Day Chairperson, and School of Leaders Chairperson. Elections will be held in the coming months. Please prayerfully consider if the Lord is calling you to serve him as part of the Cursillo Leadership team.

Do you remember the grace that you experienced on your Cursillo? Grace is a gift, freely given and intended to be shared. If we continue to live our Cursillo fourth day properly, the Voice of God will not be a faint whimper from the ashes of some long past experience, but will roar like thunder from the flames of the Holy Spirit burning in our hearts today.

So I ask you, what are you doing with the gifts that God has given you? Will you leave them wrapped up in a neat box or locked away in a footlocker? Or will you put them to good use to serve His greater glory, and store up treasure in Heaven?

PIETY, STUDY, ACTION

I am now a little more than seventy-three in my life's journey on this side of eternity. I am reflecting on sort of a 'time-line' basis; how I'm progressing in the Christian life in regards to the three pillars, piety, study and action, which are supported by the grace of God.

I've learned that piety, like other virtues is a gift of the Holy Spirit, given by God as needed for the different stages of life. At times, for me, it meant just following the rules and trying to impress God and others by how good I

was. My standard was very subjective, usually comparing myself to others until I had some major failures in my spiritual life. God, speaking through His word at a Sunday Mass, said "woe to you who are lukewarm ..." told me that mediocrity was not acceptable. Mechanical prayers, observance of commandments, and going to confession after committing a mortal sin was far

from holiness and would not get me to heaven.

I realized that, as many others, I had and still have, one foot in the world and the other just partially in the


kingdom of God. Not acceptable! "No one can serve two masters..."! A definition of piety that I could accept was to do what I'm supposed to be doing, in the moment, in the will of God. As St. Therese put it, "in all things do what love requires." This is the criteria that I often use when in doubt about making a decision.

The "Ideal" Rollo on the Cursillo helped me discern what the will of God might be for me and that it changes as I get older. It includes work, rest, fun activities, praying,

offering up minor and major difficulties as well as joys, speaking up, keeping silent, and innumerable other things. In God's will, these are all on our path to piety. Once again, from God's word I learned that through these things I can store up treasures in heaven and that where my treasure is my heart will be also.

From the lives of the saints I learned that holiness is also in the

struggles of life and receiving the Sacraments frequently is one of the ways God uses to perfect it in us. My faith that

God will do it comes from the spiritual gift of hope, also one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. I believe that what St. Paul wrote to the Philippians was also meant for me and He who has started a good work in me will also carry it through to completion.

Some of the aides that help me stay aware of God's presence throughout the day are a morning prayer and the guardian angel prayer before I even get out of bed. A holy water font at the back door, again reminds me to pray whenever I leave the house, an alarm on my phone at 6am, noon and 6pm for the Angelus prayer, often inviting others that happen to be there with me to join in. We always pray before meals. I almost always have my rosary with me, and say the Memorare when I put my scapular back on after my shower. Many of these were not lifelong habits,



but have accumulated over a lifetime so far.

The second pillar that supports my Catholic Christian life is learning more about our Lord, the Body of Christ, the Church and the Saints. The *IBreviary* app on my phone has short articles about the Saint of the Day on Memorials, Feast Days, and Solemnities. Novenas also have articles about the Saints

or feasts dedicated to them. In my early thirties, realizing how little I really knew about my faith I attended the RCIA at our parish to learn more. This later led to more classes, then helping teach in the RE program, which led to more classes, then to Kino Institute classes, Instructing RCIA, and becoming a lector at our

parish.

I'm not an avid reader but am working my way through the Diary of Saint Faustina and learning about the awesome Mercy of our Lord and the mission He entrusted to her to spread His message to the world. One of my major sources of learning is also our Catholic radio station, Relevant Radio 1310 AM. I also turn to homilies and reflections on daily readings by Bishop Robert Barron, and the bible in a year by Fr. Mike Schmitz. One of my favorite sources of study is reading through "The Imitation of Christ" by Thomas A 'Kempis. I read one meditation as part of my weekly adoration, so it takes about two years to get

through the book. When I'm done I give it away and get another for myself. It's part of my evangelization.


Action flows from piety and study. The Body of Christ was commissioned to go and be Christ in the world with Him as the head and us as members. As I live my life in my daily environment, what I say and do actually shows me



what I really believe. My Christian action starts at home with family, children and grandchildren, mostly by example; prayer before meals at home and in public. Sometimes discussion during dinner about the saint of the day or something I learned from a homily or Catholic radio; wearing the "team colors" that correspond to the feast day or liturgical season. Leaving the house in the middle of the night once a week to go to adoration sometime needs some explanation when guests stay with us or explaining to a neighbor where I go from 1:45 to 3:15am every Tuesday. I am a lector at early morning mass about eight weeks out of the year because there is a need for one. I help out with remodeling our convent for the Sisters of Life that plan to move in there around August and helped another friend set up a work storage shed at Our Lady of Guadalupe Monastery.

I sometimes feel overwhelmed when commitments pile up, but as many know, it's all part of the 4th day journey and I draw consolation from 2 Cor. 4:7-18. *Look it up*, it's well worth contemplating.

It has been home to the Cursillo for many years due to the vision of the Claretian priests who were caretakers of the Movement in Phoenix in the beginning, the devotion of Msgr. McMahon, and the love, time, and talent of many Cursillistas over the years. Support through Easy Tithe assists in ensuring that Mt. Claret remains our home for future candidates and all Cursillistas.


