

The Joy of Seeing God's Face: A Short Advent Meditation for Cursillistas from Fr. Kilian McCaffrey

LOVE ...

... beyond all imagining and all knowing.

... already born over 2,000

years ago and renewed each year in in our hearts, as it always is at this dark and cold time of year.
... is coming in to our world - and coming soon.

We are now beginning the great season of Advent. Each December we look up at the beautiful, clear night skies of the Southwest to see "the Heavens proclaiming the glory of God" (Psalm 19), and we focus our gaze toward Bethlehem in Advent at the beginning of a new liturgical year. Every Advent is an opportunity to get to know God better by getting deeper into the Scriptures: The Word of God.

We prepare and meditate on "the image of the invisible God, the first-born of creation" as St. Paul writes to the Colossians, the eternally begotten Son of the Father and "God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten not made, consubstantial with the Father. Through him all things were made." (from the Nicene Creed)

This Liturgical Year of 2018 we will focus in on the Gospel of Mark; with the beginning bolstered with the Gospels of Luke and Matthew, with their wonderful genealogies of Jesus, as well as the Gospel of John.

As Steve Ray tells us in his Bible
Study website, CatholicConvert.com:
"Mark preaches Jesus to the Romans
as a servant with no genealogy; Luke
portrays Jesus as humanity to the
Greeks with a genealogy going back to
Adam; John tells the world Jesus is
divine and as God He has no
genealogy. Matthew, however, adeptly
presents Jesus to His people as
Messiah and King with royal pedigree
through the kings to David and back to Abraham the
Patriarch of Israel (Matthew: Understanding the Tax
Collector and his Gospel).

So Christ is all things to all men; He is All in All. The great biblical themes are apparent. Added to this, we very directly focus in on the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, commonly referred to as the Fifth Gospel.

Our senses are overpowered and overawed by the symbolism of the Season of Advent leading up to Christmas.

We remember the Star of Bethlehem (the Gospel of Matthew, Chapter 2) and the glory of Creation welcoming the New Creation, Christ Our King.

During each Sunday of the Advent season, we always focus on each of the four different virtues that Jesus, The Word Made Flesh, brings to us, namely: Hope (Spes), the First Sunday; Love (Amor), the Second Sunday; Joy (Gaudium), the Third Sunday; and Peace (Pax) on the Fourth and last Sunday.

Of course, the Advent Wreath, with its four candles, symbolizes the coming of the Light into the world.

We also get to focus on John the Baptist, preparing the Way of the Lord, and The Holy Family of Mary of Nazareth, Joseph of Bethlehem and indeed the whole reason of the history of salvation is waiting in anticipation of God coming to save and comfort His people.

To paraphrase the late, great Irish author and playwright John B. Keane, "For many people Christmas is

not a great time, not a happy and joyful time: but Christmas is so great that it can absorb all the pain, all the heartache, all the loss and all the suffering of the world and still have Love leftover, overflowing in abundance."

Seize the time, seize the grace!

Among many excellent daily resources available for this season of Advent is Fr. Mark Toups' beautiful Marian study, "Theotokos" (meaning 'God-Bearer') which takes us on a stunning journey, step-by-step and Word-by-Word, through St.

Luke's and St. Matthew's Nativity Scriptures (https://marktoups.com/theotokos). Also, Bishop Jacques-Bénigne Bossuet's book *Meditations for Advent* is a very serene,

peaceful journey through Advent. Both of these resources are available online.



Our memories are identified with our life's experiences. No one else has them. Even if someone has very similar experiences, they do not possess them in the same way that we possess them.



We are blessed with six beautiful grandchildren ages eleven down to one year. We see them all often and are very much a part of their lives. Last Saturday we had one-year-old Weston and his four-year-old brother Liam over for a morning of babysitting. Anyone who hangs out with a one-year-old toddler just learning to walk, knows that it's a constant state of motion and injury. Your job as a grandparent is to be "bubble wrap" around that child so there are no major marks on his face when his parents arrive to pick him up. With Weston, this is a two-man job.



One of Weston's favorite things to do is to play in our backyard; watering the flowers, playing soccer with Grandpa B, riding a tricycle or rolling in the grass, all these activities seem to be favorites on his list. So after Weston's fifth tumble, which included a split bottom lip and newly bruised eyebrow, Brad and I thought it would be best if we just simply followed right behind him for a

while, to avoid further bodily harm.

It was my turn for Weston duty, so I followed close behind him as he ran all around the backyard. Suddenly those wobbly legs came to an abrupt stop right in front of our statue of the Blessed Mother who presides over our little rose garden. Weston stopped, smiled at Mary and began to look her up and down. Then he reached out to hold her hand, rub her face, began kissing her tummy and her cheeks, finishing his visit with a lovely conversation and a huge hug! Brad and I just stood and watched his delight and encounter with Mamma Mary. We looked at one another, knowing that we had been witness to something very precious, Mary was a real person to Weston. He was smiling ear to ear!

This was a beautiful glimpse of what I think holiness is, that calling to be closer to Christ, who better than His Mother to invite us? I keep thinking about how beautiful that encounter. 
