

The city of Waco, literally deep in the heart of Texas, is traditionally a very Baptist town. So it is strange that this was the location of the first Cursillo in the United States. As we all well know, God's ways are often most unusual and innovative!

It seems that there was not a traditionally-strong



Catholic presence in Waco. It was not until 1924 that the parish of St. Francis on the Brazos (River), located in the Diocese of Austin, was founded by Franciscan missionaries "to serve the spiritual needs of the community of central Texas. The Church, dedicated in 1931, is a replica of San Jose Mission in San Antonio, Texas"

according to the historical marker sign outside of the Church building. Several other plaques and stones commemorate the first North America Cursillo in May of 1957 and subsequent anniversary milestones.

How did this all come to pass? In his book *Cursillo History & Memory*, Francisco Forteza Pujol explains: "It happened that a young flight lieutenant in the Spanish Air Force participated in the last Cursillo held before Bishop

afterward, he found that, in accord with the Spanish-USA mutual military agreement, he would be sent for a specialized combat jet training program to a military base near Laredo, Texas. This was near Waco, in the diocese of Austin, where Father Gabriel Fernandez, a Franciscan from Mallorca, now worked. He had made his Cursillo in his home country years before, and was looking



for ways to establish the movement in the territory evangelized by Junipero Serra." (p. 157-158)

And so the stage was set for movement to begin in the new world. Along with Agustin Palomino, a second Spanish Air Force officer and colleague of Vadell, and with the help of Fr. Fernandez, the first Cursillo was held at St. Francis of the Brazos Church. A bilingual commemoration stone is set into the wall outside the Church dates it to May 27th, 1957.

Next month, we will explore the spread of the Cursillo to Phoenix in November of 1959. May the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit bless you all this month of July when we honor St. Junipero Serra.

Baseball, Hot Dogs, Apple Pie, and Catholic Faith

July is upon us, and our minds naturally turn to the things of summer; perhaps a vacation at the beach or camping in the cool

mountains. The baseball season is in full swing and fans flock to the ballpark to cheer on their team, and are hoping that their favorite players will play in the All Star Game, affectionately known as the "Midsummer Classic". Our culinary tastes tend to turn to cooking over a barbecue grill in the great outdoors, and maybe jumping in the pool to cool off. Of course one of the highlights of summer is the Fourth of July, and the oohs and aahs of children young and old as we watch the fireworks displays. The events and activities of summer speak of "Americana", and remind us of how blessed we are to live in this great nation.

But it takes more than just creature comforts and prosperity to make a nation great. So what is it that makes the United States a Nation set apart? The Venerable Bishop Fulton J. Sheen, who was an outspoken opponent of Cold War Communism and champion of the American way of government said that there were three principle glories of being an American. (Reference: Life is Worth Living show, https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5vQiefQ6FJw.)

The first glory is that our founding fathers had the foresight to recognize the source of our rights and liberties is not from man and our own designs, but from God our Father. They discerned that if rights came from Parliament, as was the popular thought in Europe at the time, or by a solitary leader, or a majority rule, than the government could take those rights and liberties away from the citizens at its discretion, resulting in just



the type of totalitarian rule that they were rebelling against. Although these men were the products of the Enlightenment and Protestant reformation, Charles Carroll being the only Catholic signer of the Declaration of Independence, they borrowed heavily form Catholic teaching in formulating their idea of government. In the very first sentence Thomas Jefferson cites the "Natural Law", and then famously brings the point home in the second

sentence; "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are ENDOWED BY THEIR CREATOR with certain inalienable rights; that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Bishop Sheen states that our Declaration of Independence is in fact a "Declaration of Dependence" on God and on Law. It is the duty of the Law of government to protect the God given rights and liberties of its citizens, which no one can take away. In the Bishop's words, "If we wish to keep our liberties, we must keep our God. Piety and Patriotism go together."

The second American glory according to Bishop Sheen can be found in the opening line of the Constitution; "We the People". Our founders envisioned a republic consisting of persons, who have inherent value, regardless of their station in society. Again borrowing from Catholic social teaching, they recognized the dignity of the human person, who is created in the image and likeness of God. Sheen says that "Democracy is a branch, not a root." The root of America is that we have a

foundational belief that every person has value, even those who do not make a substantial contribution to the economy, such as babies, or the sick and elderly. When



we remember this basic truth, we can see the societal issues with compassion for humanity. Bishop Sheen expressed it this way: "I begin to think less of the problem of poverty and more of the poor; less of the problem of crime and more of the criminal; less about age and more about service to a Stranger Who lives with all the slum dwellers who have no place to lay their heads. All the little children separated from parents are as one child."

The third glory is our relationship to the rest of the world. From its very beginnings our nation has been a sanctuary to the persecuted people of the world. Our forefathers journeyed to a New World to escape religious persecution, and throughout our history immigrants from all nations have come to escape poverty, famine and violence. As the Statue of Liberty calls with words of welcome "Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!" America not only has been a sanctuary, but we've also became an arsenal in the cause for international justice. Our troops have courageously fought on foreign shores in two World Wars, and other conflicts in the name of freedom, without seeking the gain of any territory or having ambitions of colonialism. America has also been a pantry offering aide for the world's poor and hungry. Catholic American leaders such as Knight of Columbus R. Sargent Shriver helped form international organizations such as the Peace Corp and Special Olympics.

Cursillo literature given to us by our founder, Eduardo Bonin, instructs us to remain true to what is essential. In many ways the same can be said for our nation. The freedoms which we enjoy, independent of God, are not the essence of democracy. Twentieth century world history is proof that the further nations stray from God, the more totalitarian its

government becomes and the less freedom its citizens will have. Fulton Sheen says that "given a freedom independent of the moral law, independent of inalienable rights as the endowment of the Divine Spirit, America could vote itself out of democracy tomorrow." So this Independence Day, let's

remember our Dependence on our Father and Creator, who by Divine Grace has granted us with the gifts of Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness. May we continue to stand strong upon the foundation of the rock of Faith, and may God bless America.

Opportunities for Apostolic Action in Our Environments

As Cursillistas, we know that apostolic action is an expression and outcome of our love for God. Opportunities for apostolic action in our environments are abound. What will we do with these opportunities?

After 27 years, my husband Victor and I decided to sell our Ahwatukee home. We knew that God was guiding us to where He needed us to be. We bought a house in the middle of a cul-de-sac in the Ocotillo area of Chandler. We moved in to our new home on our wedding anniversary on November 13th and we immediately felt a spiritual comfort. By December, we introduced ourselves to each family in our neighborhood and quickly noticed that we lived in a very diverse neighborhood by the different ages, ethnicities and religions. As Christmas and Easter passed and the summer months came, we gradually became friends with our neighbors. At that point it was our way of just making friends and speaking to God about our friends.

Seven months later the Mormon family living next to us experienced a terrible tragedy. Rob, the father of the family, was hit by a truck while jogging across a street one busy morning

and died from internal injuries. He left behind a wife, April, and four children. After the initial shock, Victor and I felt a tremendous feeling of sadness for the young family and for the neighbors who knew Rob for many years. We only knew Rob for seven months and could not imagine all of the pain that would consume the neighborhood. Victor and I sprang into action and informed the neighbors about Rob's passing while another neighbor elicited help from others to purchase gift cards from various stores

and restaurants that we could give to April. That was the easy part. The difficult part was deciding to have a prayer meeting with all of the neighbors while not knowing their level of spirituality. Thankfully, everyone attended the prayer meeting at a neighbor's home. As tears flowed and we hugged one another, we gathered in a circle to say our special intentions for April and her children.

I must admit, when it was my turn to pray I was somewhat hesitant. But I knew that moment was for everyone to get closer to Christ and to our Blessed Mother Mary. Victor and I and our youngest daughter, along with a couple of other families, prayed to Jesus and said a Hail Mary. Several people were not familiar with the Hail Mary prayer which was to be expected. Jesus just wanted us to love the families spiritually as He loves us. The Holy Spirit carried us all through the moment of companionship and provided the grace for us to know that April and her children would be fine. After the prayer meeting, we all went to our homes and grabbed the gifts and food and took them over to April. The following week we attended the Mormon funeral service. I remember admiring the family's strength as I watched April's children sing bravely in front of a crowd of people. I kept praying that one day the family would get to know Jesus as their savior, but I also understood that God has a plan for everyone.

I've had opportunities to speak about my Catholic faith with individuals in my environment. This spring, I hosted a Cursillo overnighter at my house for the May Cursillo team. The many cars that were parked in the cul-de-sac sparked interest for sure!

That evening after the overnighter, I attended the neighborhood block party. People came up to me and asked what the overnighter was for and what "Cursillo" was. I felt empowered to explain piety, study and action as individuals had a genuine interest in what I had to say. That was because Victor and I made friends before we brought them to Christ. It was a perfect opportunity to connect with fellow Christians and for those looking for a conversion. Imagine if Victor and I had not put

out a plan, if we were not sure of ourselves, and if we had not showed enthusiasm for what we believed. These opportunities would have slipped away. Now that it has been a year since Rob passed away, April invited the neighbors to her home for a dinner and a tribute for Rob. Obviously, we have not finished evangelizing to this new environment that God has set in front of us! It takes time, it takes continuous effort, and it takes faith!

On February 15, 2015, The Chancellor of the Diocese of Mallorca, Spain, read the written petition as the first step toward the beatification of the founder of the Cursillo Movement, Eduardo Bonnin Aguilo. The petition was presented by the Cursillo Secretariat of the Diocese of Mallorca, and was solicited by the national Secretariats of Italy, Portugal, and El Salvador. Bonnin can now be called Servant of God, and we can pray for his intercession. Any miracles which occur as the result of his intercession can be submitted to the postulator, Father Gabriel Ramis, at Feba-usa.org, as a possible step toward the cause of beatification or canonization of Eduardo Bonnín.

Vatican approved prayer for intercession

"Oh God, the dispenser of all graces and charisms, You granted your servant Eduardo Bonnín Aguilo the grace of dedicating his whole life with humility and generosity, to the work of the Cursillos in Christianity Movement, as he traveled the five continents proclaiming that God in Christ loves us. Grant us through his intercession the favore that we now implore Thee. (Name favor being requested.) Also grant us the grace, of his beatification for your greater glory and the good of your Church, that shines throughout the lives of its saints. We beg this of you in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen." (At the end pray the Lord's Prayer.)


